Mr Scott-Evans writes.....

Smartphones, Childhood and the Culture We Want to Create

"Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it." Proverbs 4:23

Last week, I wrote about writing, thinking and learning in an age of artificial intelligence. Today, I want to continue that theme by looking at another powerful technology shaping young people's lives: the smartphone. As you will all know, concerns about mobile phones and particularly with young people have risen sharply in recent months. National debates are well underway, the media is paying close attention, and many

parents are increasingly asking for advice on how best to manage their children's online lives. The Secretary of State for Education has recently given clear, unambiguous guidance that schools should be phonefree for the entire school day. This reflects what many teachers and leaders see every day: the impact that constant connectivity can have on learning, relationships and wellbeing.

At Becket Keys, we already have a strong, consistent policy. Students may bring phones into school, but from the moment they step onto the site they must be switched off and put away. If a phone is seen or heard, it is confiscated. Students understand this and comply. This approach

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works well, and it reflects our desire to teach young people to manage temptation, not to avoid it entirely.

We have not needed expensive systems like Yondr pouches because, on the whole, our students act responsibly. However, even within an effective system, there are signs that we need to consider our next steps. From time to time, phones buzz in pockets because they are not properly switched off and students can be tempted to look at their social media or games during the day in the toilets or in a quiet corner.

Students tell us they worry about safety, social media pressure and the effect of phones on their sleep and wellbeing. Parents and staff agree. Most students use their devices as sensibly as they can, but even so, the risks remain and the effect on students' brains and development is concerning.



We are responding thoughtfully, calmly, and with a long-term view to the development of student character.

Therefore, from September, our new Year 7 cohort will not be permitted to bring smartphones into school at all, with the aim of gradually establishing a smartphone-free environment across all KS3 and 4 year groups. This is the "Gold" standard in the national Smartphone Free Schools rating system, and many of our current Year 7 have already adopted this approach. Students will be allowed to bring a simple 'brick' phone, if they wish which many parents prefer for safety, but our preference will be no phone at all.

'Brick' phones now often come with tracking features and allow calls and texts—everything a child might need for reassurance, without the risks that come with social media, internet browsing and constant notifications. For Years 8–11, our existing "not seen, not heard" policy will remain in place. It works. It is respected. However, as now, students who repeatedly misuse their devices can lose the right to bring a smartphone at all.

Sixth Formers will continue as now: devices allowed in Sixth Form area only.

Furthermore, any student or family who wishes to adopt the no smartphone approach voluntarily is warmly encouraged to do so. Less phone, more life! The benefits of reduced smartphone use are well-established. Time and time again, research shows:

1. Improved focus when no device is buzzing away with notifications.
2. Better wellbeing, including sleep, confidence, and social connection.
3. Fewer social media difficulties, which too often are causing problems for girls and boys.
4. Calmer and more genuine face-to-face friendships.

Parents often tell us they want strong boundaries, but also that it is hard to enforce these at home. We hope our approach gives families clarity, consistency and support. The school is hopefully supporting parents with the key messages they want to give themselves.



This is not about punishment or control; it is about protection, wisdom, and forming healthy habits for life.

We will continue to work closely with parents as we move forward. Our website has extensive guidance on online safety, and we provide free tools such as access

to the RET Online Safety Hub and resources like Qustodio to help families manage devices at home.

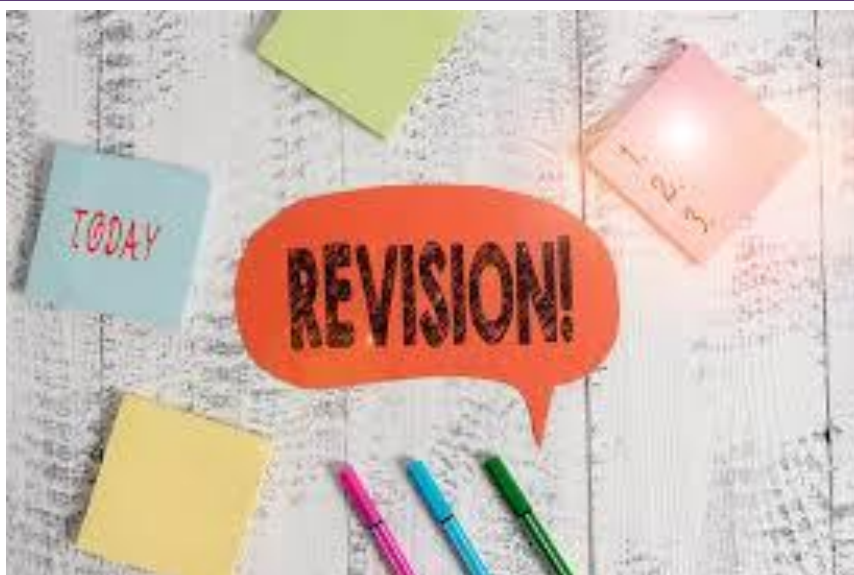
We will write to new Year 7 families in March; the message will be included with those letters that welcome them to our school family.

National Apprenticeship Week in the Sixth Form

We have had an exciting week in the Sixth Form for National Apprenticeship week, 9th to the 13th February. The students have had three Alumni speakers in to talk about their experiences of applying for apprenticeships and what it is like to be an apprentice. Their experiences varied, we had alumni students from JP Morgan, a buyer and merchandiser for Amazon, an accountant from Citibank and tech startup company, Cello. Then a Quantity surveyor from MAGC, talked about his job managing big projects and the interview process. The alumni students were exceptional, and the sixth form got some really good advice. All the alumni students presented well and talked about their interview experience, what

it is like to be an apprentice and how they got the jobs.

The 'take homes' from these talks are you need to pursue many apprenticeships, do not get downhearted from rejections. Consider your own skills and experiences and how these would work with the companies' missions and aims. The most important point that students have learnt is to start a professional LinkedIn profile, to connect with companies and other apprentices. We have set up a school community that current and alumni students are be able to join by adding Becket Keys Church of England School to their list of educational establishments and following us.

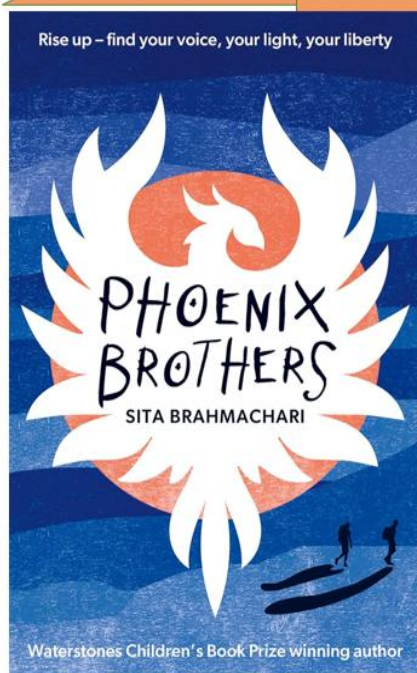
