Task 1

Task 3

Read the poem 'I Want the Confidence' by Raymond Antrobus of below: https://www.brinkerhoffpoetry.org/poems/i-want-the-confidence-of

Write a short essay (roughly 500-750 words) responding to the following question: Explore how Antrobus presents identity and emotions in 'I Want the Confidence of'.

Success Criteria:

- Be a relevant response to the question
- Explore how Antrobus creates meanings through her choice of language, form and structure
- Make links between the poem and its context

Extension – Read a work of non-fiction from the list below. Once finished, write a 300-word pitch explaining why your book should be taught on the English syllabus at school.

Tara Westover **Educated**

- A memoir that describes the struggle of a young girl who escapes from violence and an emotional prison in search of education. It is a conflicting story of fierce family loyalty as well as that of the intense sorrow that arises from the division of one's closest ties.

J. D. Vance Hillbilly Elegy

- When J.D. Vance was eleven, his drug-addicted mother chased him across farmland after threatening to murder him by crashing the car, with Vance taking refuge in a stranger's house until the police arrived. When he turned eighteen, Vance managed another dramatic escape, this time from his dysfunctional 'hillbilly' background, joining the marines to serve in Iraq.

Reni Eddo-Lodge Why I'm No Longer Talking to White People About Race

— A charged and necessary wake-up call to pervasive, institutionalised racism, Eddo-Lodge's searing polemic reconstitutes the frame of the argument around race, removing it from the hands of those with little experience of its resonances. From ambient and lazy cultural stereotyping to open hostility, Why I'm No Longer Talking to White People About Race is a clarion call of understanding.

Paul Kalinithi When Breath Becomes Air

This is a non-fiction autobiographical book written by American Neurosurgeon Dr. Paul Kalanithi. It is a memoir about his life and illness, battling stage IV metastatic lung cancer. It begins with the onset of his symptoms; the book then takes readers back in time to trace his development from a bookish teenager and inquisitive student to a talented and well-trained resident with a bright future in neurosurgery ahead of him.

Maya Angelou I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings

 The first of seven autobiographical works by American writer Maya Angelou, published in 1969. The book chronicles her life from age 3 through age 16, recounting an unsettled and sometimes traumatic childhood that included rape and racism. It became one of the most widely read and taught books written by an African American woman.

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie We Should All Be Feminists

We Should All Be Feminists is a short book by Adichie in which she argues that being
a feminist means understanding and acknowledging that sexism exists. Adichie recalls a male friend
in her home country of Nigeria calling her a "feminist," clearly meaning it as an insult.
